## Appropriation Language:

\$1,000,000 the first year and \$1,000,000 the second year are from the trust fund to the commissioner of natural resources to provide matching grants to local units of government for acquisition and development of regional parks, regional trails, and trail connections. The local match required for a grant to acquire a regional park or regional outdoor recreation area is two dollars of nonstate money for each three dollars of state money. This appropriation is available until June 30, 2014, by which time the project must be completed and final products delivered.

# I. PROJECT TITLE: Regional Park, Trail, and Trail Connection Acquisition and Development Grants

# II. PROJECT SUMMARY:

The Regional Park Grant Program, Regional Trail Grant Program, and Local Trail Connections Program provide competitive matching grants, as authorized under MN Statutes 85.019, to local governments for land acquisition and improvements related to parks and trails. The Regional Park Grant Program and the Regional Trail Grant Program are for regionally significant projects outside the seven county Metro Area. Local Trail Connections are for local projects connecting communities, trails, and parks statewide.

These programs are at the front line of the DNR's effort to partner with local communities in providing access to outdoor recreation opportunities. Connecting citizens with the outdoors through trail and park facilities enhance Minnesota's stewardship ethic and further the goals of the Department's Strategic Conservation Agenda. Trails in local communities are known to provide many social and health benefits and are highly desired. For example, connecting people from where they live with desirable locations, such as schools, businesses, neighborhoods, and recreation facilities, help promote environmentally friendly transportation alternatives and encourage reductions in greenhouse gas emissions.

<u>Regional Park Grants:</u> Local governments are struggling to acquire and develop regional park and trail land as larger land holdings are subdivided for development and competition increases for limited shore land areas. The 60% state contribution is matched by at least a 40% local contribution. The goal of this program is to help local governments acquire and develop land to meet the needs of present and future generations for natural resource based outdoor recreation. Properties acquired under this program are retained for public use in perpetuity and local government recipients are responsible for the ongoing operations and maintenance costs. This program has helped local governments acquire about 2,700 acres of regional park land since 2001.

<u>Regional Trail Grants:</u> Regional Trail Grants help fund projects for acquisition or development of trails of regional or statewide significance. In 2009, the Department received requests from local units of government for over \$16 million in Regional Trail grants and Regional Trail Legacy grants with \$2 million available in funding. These projects help acquire and develop longer distance trail corridors. Regional Trail grants require a 25% local match. Since 2001, this program has helped 27 communities acquire and/or develop 107 miles of regional trail.

<u>Local Trail Connections Grants</u>: Local Trail Connections grants fund projects for acquisition or development of local trail connections across Minnesota. These projects are primarily for shorter distance connections between residential areas, schools, businesses, parks, and trails. These projects help expand the connection between individuals and the outdoors by providing funding for local outdoor recreation infrastructure that also provides for alternative transportation, which results in decreased greenhouse gas emissions. Local Trail Connections grants require a 25% local match. Since 2001, this program has helped 75 communities fund acquisition and/or development of 69 miles of trail connections.

# IV. PROJECT ACTIVITIES AND OUTCOMES:

ACTIVITY 1: Grants for Regional Parks, Regional Trails, and Trail Connections

**Description:** This request will provide 10 to 19 matching grants to cities and counties for acquisition and/or development of Regional Parks, Regional Trails, and Trail Connections, resulting in approximately 400-700 acres for new or expanded regional parks outside the seven county Metro Area. Two grant rounds are proposed. The local match for projects funded at the requested level would exceed \$1.7 million.

As a condition of subgrants awarded from this appropriation for fee title acquisitions, the grantees will submit the following information to the LCCMR and in one instance to Minnesota Management and Budget as described below:

1. Proof that their elected board has approved the acquisition of the land being acquired in part with the Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund appropriation.

2. A restoration and management plan for the land being acquired that is consistent with LCCMR guidelines for restoration plans.

3. Identify funding source(s) to implement the restoration and management plan.

4. The results of an analysis to the LCCMR and Minnesota Management and Budget which identifies increased operations and maintenance costs likely to be incurred by the grantee as a result of the acquisition and how these costs will be paid.

5. Description of project selection process, including necessary project criteria and the decision making process used to sort/rank projects.

6. A list of the proposed acquisitions will be provided once the grant awards have been made.

7. A parcel-scale map of the acquired land.

8. Annual land acquisition report forms (initial and follow-up annual reports) which includes the transaction costs and revenue sources for acquiring the parcel in fee or a permanent easement.

9. A copy of the recorded restrictive covenant agreement between the DNR and the grantee containing provisions in MS 116P.15, Subd. 2, ( c ) for the land which requires approval by the LCCMR if the land is proposed to be sold, transferred, pledged or otherwise disposed of or further encumbered.
