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MAIN PROPOSAL

PROJECT TITLE: Natural and Scenic Area Acquisition

I. PROJECT STATEMENT: Natural areas, scenic vistas, undeveloped shore lands, remnant prairies, bluff lands and related areas are often threatened by development and other land use changes. Once these areas are developed the benefits they provide for rare or endangered species protection, habitat, water quality, preservation of aesthetic landscapes and vistas, wildlife observation, and outdoor recreation are lost. Acquisition by local governments is often an appropriate way to protect these areas and make them available for public use. Such acquisition helps meet the goals of water quality and habitat protection and ensuring adequate natural resource based outdoor recreation opportunities for future generations to enjoy. This program helps governments afford the cost of acquisition by providing matching grants. Land acquired must retained as public natural and scenic areas in perpetuity.

II. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT RESULTS

Result 1: Natural and Scenic Area Grants Budget: \$950,000

The requested funding will provide two or more matching grants to cities, counties, townships or school districts for acquisition of approximately 100-200 acres for new or expanded natural and scenic areas. One grant round is proposed. These grants require a 50% state/50% local match. The local match for projects funded at the requested level would meet or exceed \$1 million.

Result 2: Administrative/Personnel Costs **Budget:** \$50,000 The requested funding will be used to support personnel costs for administering the grant programs. Grant staff persons are involved in grant solicitation, evaluation and ranking, grant agreement management, project billings, project inspections, and compliance monitoring.

As shown in the Project Budget, personnel expenses will be incurred by three DNR classified staff involved in administering this grant program. Payment of classified staff with Environment and Natural Resources Trust Fund money will not result in supplanting the regular budget. A cost coding system is used to document the hours spent by each staff person in administering the program. Two grant staff would each contribute about 8% of a Full Time Equivalent (FTE) per year and the program manager would contribute about 3% of an FTE per year. The total staff contribution will be about .6 FTE over the three year project period.

III. PROJECT STRATEGY

A. Project Team/Partners

Projects are local governments and school districts. They will provide match dollars as well as covering the costs of appraisals, any required archeological/historical surveys, permits, etc. They will also assume all operations and maintenance costs.

B. Timeline Requirements

This is an ongoing program. The request is for one annual grant solicitation. An additional \$1 million would be needed to fund a second year grant round resulting in a similar level of project activity. The statutory grant limit for this program is \$500,000.

C. Long-Term Strategy

The long term strategy for the Natural and Scenic Area Grant program is to provide an incentive to local governments to protect natural and scenic resources that do not qualify for state designation, but have important regional or local significance. These areas complement state protected areas and provide close-to-home opportunities for nature study, science and environmental education, species protection, outdoor recreation, and appreciation of scenic vistas. These areas can play a role in addressing the increasing disconnect between people and nature.
