MAIN PROPOSAL

PROJECT TITLE: "Green Acres" and Farmland Conservation in Minnesota

I. PROJECT STATEMENT

When Minnesota's Statewide Conservation and Preservation Plan was released last year, one of its Targeted Policy and Action Recommendations was: "Invest in farm and forest preservation to prevent fragmentation due to development." This recommendation was cited for its "critical impact" on the state's terrestrial habitat quality and soil/land quality; and the "significant impact" on Minnesota's water quality/quantity, biodiversity, aquatic community health, economic health, recreational/cultural/spiritual/aesthetic value, and climate change mitigation/adaptation.

The overall goals of this proposal are to preserve farmland and adjacent forest land, and promote attendant ecological and public benefits on a statewide basis, by (1) creating educational tools that will promote the broad and uniform impact of the state's newly revised "Green Acres" law to preserve precious agricultural land – both in production and in conservation reserve – from development; and (2) develop statewide policy and zoning tools, and convene stakeholders across interest areas, to preserve agricultural lands, especially in the metro region.

As the Preservation Plan noted, the loss of farmland "results from both the direct conversion of agricultural land to development and the fragmentation of agricultural areas by suburban and exurban sprawl." The Green Acres program, which values farmland for tax purposes based on its agricultural value rather than its future development potential, is one of the state's most powerful tools to keep open spaces in production or preserved in conservation status. But the program, as extensively amended in both 2008 and 2009, is enormously complex and, according to the Legislative Auditor, has been administered inconsistently on the county level and had not been offered to many eligible landowners.

At the same time, Minnesota needs a thorough, independent set of policy recommendations to preserve the natural resource – and natural resource protection – that is our farmland. The laws that affect farmland preservation are now a patchwork of local, county, and state laws. As some of the most experienced agricultural lawyers in the state, FLAG views as necessary the production of a proposed model legal framework and zoning tools to create a consistent and effective plan to make sure that agricultural lands remain an important component of a healthy environment and precious natural resources of Minnesota.

II. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT RESULTS

Result 1: "Guide to Minnesota's Green Acres Program"

Budget: \$124,950

To complete this proposal, FLAG's legal staff will review and analyze applicable laws; interview assessors, farmers, and experts knowledgeable about preservation of Minnesota farmland; and produce educational materials that will assist stakeholders to conserve the ecological resource that is Minnesota's farmland.

Result 2: Preserving Minnesota Agricultural Land: Proposed Policy Solutions Budget: \$100,000

To complete this portion of the proposal, FLAG's legal staff will review and analyze applicable laws; interview farmers and solicit their experiences and input; convene meetings of stakeholders and experts who are knowledgeable about and can speak to challenges to preservation of Minnesota farmland; and produce proposed policy solutions that promote a more comprehensive and systematic approach to preserving Minnesota's farmland.

III. PROJECT STRATEGY

A. Project Team/Partners

FLAG's Project Team, led by Executive Director Susan Stokes, is among the most experienced agricultural law resources in the country, with decades of work on behalf of farmers and the public policy that governs them. Over the last two decades, FLAG has written, published, and distributed more than 100,000 copies of numerous accurate, reliable and accessible guides and reports, including *"Farmers' Guide to Minnesota Lending Law," "Farmers' Guide to FmHA," "Farmers' Guide to Disaster Assistance," "Farmers' Guide to GMOs,"* and *"Farmers' Guide to Wind Energy,"* all of which are used not only by farmers, but also local, state, and federal officials; agri-business managers; extension agents; and lawmakers. Ms. Stokes will oversee the management and production of the Project's deliverables, with the support of Senior Staff Attorneys Stephen Carpenter and Jill Krueger, Staff Attorney Jennifer Jambor-Delgado, and Program Director Lynn Hayes.

B. Timeline Requirements

The first segment of the Project, the production of the *"Land Owners' Guide to Minnesota's Green Acres Program,"* will take roughly one year to produce, the first half devoted to research and interviews, the second half to writing and production. The distribution of the Guide will take place over the three months subsequent to publication. The second segment of the Project will require a longer-term investment in order to do research and then convene the necessary stakeholders for their critical input. The research and stakeholder input stage is expected to take a year and a half, with the analysis and recommendations to follow six months later.

C. Long-Term Strategy

This proposal is intended to assist the state in considering and devising a broader policy strategy to preserve Minnesota's rapidly diminishing farmland, particularly in the regions surrounding the state's urban areas.
