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MAIN PROPOSAL

PROJECT TITLE: New Curriculum and Activities for Minnesota Outdoor Classrooms

I. PROJECT STATEMENT

- 1. To create a future citizenry that will respect Minnesota's natural resources, it's necessary to instill in today's youth an appreciation and understanding of the natural world through outdoor explorations, discoveries and lessons. The Leopold Education Project has trained teachers for 15 years with a nationally recognized curriculum "Lessons in a Land Ethic" – the only curriculum to incorporate a classic piece of literature (A Sand County Almanac). In fact, an LCCMR grant several years ago helped fund Leopold Education Project training. Recognizing that the need to connect youth to the outdoors is greater than ever, Pheasants Forever has launched the NO CHILD LEFT INDOORS® Initiative, of which the Leopold Education Project is part. In 2009, two new teaching tools were completed: 1) "Lessons in GPS Technology: Connecting Students to Nature" and 2) "Exploring the Outdoors with Aldo Leopold" (an outdoor activities guide). Both offer formal and non-formal educators lessons to explore the outdoors using critical thinking skills and hands-on activities for all ages. The key is getting these new tools into the hands of teachers, naturalists, park rangers and others through training workshops. An LCCMR grant would allow the Leopold Education Project to accelerate delivery in Minnesota and thus reach more educators more quickly.
- 2. Goal: Educate Minnesota youth (and indirectly their families) about Minnesota's natural resources and how to enjoy, protect and responsibly use. Through six training workshops offered around the state in two years, 40 facilitators (who in turn can train other educators) and 80 educators will be trained in how to use the new lessons and activities in outdoor settings. In addition, teaching trunks will be made available to further provide resources. Once trained, the educators can reach youth and their families in communities around the state through classrooms, nature centers, parks and zoos, community events and special activities.
- 3. How to achieve goals:
 - a. Train 40 facilitators who can in turn train others to use the new Leopold Education Project lessons.
 - b. Train 80 educators, formal and non-formal, to use the new Leopold Education Project lessons and activities in their classrooms and programs.
 - c. Provide resource materials and teaching trunks.

II. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT RESULTS

Result 1: Facilitator Training

A facilitator workshop consists of two days of training and includes background on Pheasants Forever and the Leopold Education Project, a historic perspective on Aldo Leopold and his book *A Sand County Almanac,* hands-on introduction to lessons from "Lessons in GPS Technology" and activities in "Exploring the Outdoors with Aldo Leopold," and opportunities to practice teach from both. Participants will leave able to offer educator workshops.

- 1. Two facilitator workshops in different locations in the state
- 2. 40 facilitators trained representing at least 20 communities

Result 2: Educator Training

Educator workshops are offered to teachers, naturalists, youth program leaders, Pheasants Forever chapter leaders, park rangers and others who work with youth and their families. The one-day workshops will include hands-on instruction in either or both of the new resources.

- 1. Four educator workshops in different locations in the state
- 2. 80 facilitators trained representing at least 40 communities

Result 3: Teaching trunks (2)

Two teaching trunks will be created with materials needed to teach workshops for each of the new Leopold Education Project programs

Deliverable

- 1. Teaching trunk with GPS receivers, rechargeable batteries and By July 2011 units and other needed resources to teach "Lessons in GPS Technology"
- 2. Teaching trunk with needed resources to offer activities for By July 2011 "Exploring the Outdoors with Aldo Leopold"

III. PROJECT STRATEGY

A. Project Team/Partners

Project team will be:

From Pheasants Forever: Janine Kohn, National Leopold Education Project Coordinator, will oversee workshops, help conduct facilitator trainings, recruit participants and create trunks.

Minnesota Leopold Education Project State Coordinator: Dr. William Faber, Ph.D, CWB, Natural Resources Instructor, Central Lakes College, Brainerd, will conduct workshops working with other Leopold Education Project facilitators.

B. Timeline Requirements

Facilitator workshops will be conducted first year; educator workshops will be conducted in first and second years. Trunks will be completed first year.

C. Long-Term Strategy

Pheasants Forever will continue to support the Leopold Education Project in Minnesota beyond the time period specified here. LCCMR funding, however, will provide a quicker infusion of newly trained educators to engage youth in learning about Minnesota's natural resources in outdoor settings that we could not otherwise achieve. The more educators trained, the more youth that can be reached. With LCCMR funding for two years, Pheasants Forever will be able to ask chapters to help fund the new NO CHILD LEFT INDOORS® Initiative rather than just fund Leopold Education Project trainings. Once LCCMR grant monies have been used and a network of educators trained, Pheasants Forever chapters in Minnesota can resume funding one or two Leopold Education Project workshops a year.

Project Manager: Janine Kohn

Janine is the National Education Specialist for Pheasants Forever and National Coordinator for the Leopold Education Project. She has worked for Pheasants Forever since 2001. Formerly she was a middle school science teacher/outdoor education instructor and was the assistant director of an international summer adventure camp.

Currently Janine conducts workshops around the country and trains educators in the Leopold Program. She has designed national curriculum materials for Pheasants Forever and is currently serving on a committee, with 11 other representatives in the state of MN, to propose legislation to include outdoor education in Minnesota schools grades 7-12.

Janine is an adjunct professor at Hamline University in Minnesota and offers graduate credits for LEP trainings. Janine is a national presenter on the Leopold Education Project and Pheasant's Forever's NO CHILD LEFT INDOORS® initiative. In additional, she is a facilitator for Project Wild; Project Wet; Project Learning Tree; Project Food, Land & People. She has a certificate in environmental education and is completing her master's degree in environmental education.

Organization Description: Pheasants Forever is a non-profit organization incorporated in Minnesota in 1982 that is dedicated to the conservation of pheasants, quail and other wildlife through habitat improvements, public awareness, education and land management policies and programs. Pheasants Forever created the Leopold Education Project in 1993 to educate citizenry in Minnesota and across the country about the importance of natural resources and to teach young people about the land ethic of Aldo Leopold.
