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MAIN PROPOSAL

PROJECT TITLE: Environmental Education for Educators and Tree Care Professionals

I. PROJECT STATEMENT

Environmental education is a key building block for supporting innovation and leadership on environmental issues. This project involves the development and promotion of the F.R.E.E Network (www.freenetwork.org) as an education resource for environmental educators, professionals, students and the general public. This project will significantly expand the resources offered through the F.R.E.E Network and deliver workshops and education engagement services to teachers, decision makers, and tree care professionals. The expansion of the F.R.E.E. Network site and the curriculum for the workshops will include addressing urban and community forestry, climate change and the role of forests in carbon sequestration. Workshops will be hosted in an outdoor classroom setting through partnerships with environmental learning centers and regional parks.

The goal of the project is to increase the awareness of educators, community leaders and tree care professionals about forest resources in Minnesota, including urban and community forests, and the role of forests in mitigating climate change. The workshops will provide tips and tools that educators can use in their classrooms, community leaders can use to inform policies and tree ordinances, and that arborists can use in their businesses and client services. The F.R.E.E. Network will continue to provide free, public access to the resources.

II. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT RESULTS

Result 1: Expansion of the FREE Network Site Budget: \$70,000

The first outcome of the project is the significant expansion of the F.R.E.E. Network to provide an ongoing source of scientifically accurate information regarding the role of forests, including urban and community forests, in mitigating climate change, and consideration of alternative strategies for dealing with carbon emissions and maximizing carbon sequestration potential within forests. Educational tools will be developed to stimulate thinking and awareness on the part of students. An entirely new section of the F.R.E.E. Network site will be developed to focus on community leaders and urban and community forest professionals. The target audience of the project is students and educators (the current target of the F.R.E.E. Network). The information to be developed is also important for community leaders and urban tree care specialists to guide pursuit of optimum carbon strategies in urban and community forests and tree care management.

Result 2: Delivery of Workshops Budget: \$80,000

A total of at least 5 workshops will be held in diverse statewide locations (e.g., Twin Cities, Mankato, Grand Rapids, Duluth and Brainerd). The workshops will be held at a local environmental learning center, regional park facilities or other locations that can support an outdoor classroom opportunity. The trainers for the workshops will include Dovetail staff and other educators. The curriculum will include addressing urban and community forestry, climate change and the role of forests. Workshops will be marketed to students and educators, and the information to be developed is also important for community leaders and urban and community tree care specialists to guide pursuit of optimum carbon strategies in urban and community forests and tree care management.

The project manager will complete a final project report that summarizes the results and impacts of the project and offers recommendations for any opportunities for improvement or next steps.

III. PROJECT STRATEGY

A. Project Team/Partners

The project manager and coordinator for the workshops and other deliverables is Steve Bratkovich, Program Director with Dovetail Partners, Inc.

Steve Bratkovich, Ph.D., has 34 years of forestry and forest products experience. His areas of expertise include business, marketing and strategic planning; urban wood utilization; primary and secondary wood processing; and sustainable forest management. Steve has authored over 150 forestry-related publications, articles and reports, and is a frequent contributor to forestry and industry trade journals. Steve is past Chair of the Southern Chapter, Minnesota Society of American Foresters, and was active in the Chapters' Natural Resources in the Classroom project. Through this effort, Steve interacted with students and educators as both an instructor and coordinator of environmental education programs. Steve has also coordinated and delivered programs across the country for urban and community forestry audiences including arborists, municipal foresters, tree service firms, and elected officials. He currently serves as an Associate Editor to the Journal of Forestry and is Managing Editor for Independent Sawmill and Woodlot Management magazine's "Green Column." In 2002 Steve received the Excellence in Technology Transfer award from the Chief of the USDA Forest Service. Steve has also received outstanding service awards from the Ohio and Minnesota Society of American Foresters. Steve is a forestry consultant and an Adjunct Associate Professor with the University of Minnesota's Department of Bioproducts and Biosystems Engineering.

B. Timeline Requirements

The project is anticipated to take two years to complete. The workshops will be scheduled between March and November of 2011 to support outdoor classroom opportunities.

C. Long-Term Strategy

This project is not a component of a larger project; however, the results of this project may identify gaps or needs related to environmental education opportunities in Minnesota. The results of this project may be used to inform other current and future efforts related to environmental education in the state.
