I. PROJECT STATEMENT

Minnesota has a proud heritage as a great outdoor state. That rich history and culture is at risk unless we make large-scale and coordinated efforts to counteract the current trend of lack of engagement in outdoor pursuits such as fishing, hunting, camping, and canoeing by people under the age of 30.

The *Youth Outdoors* project builds on the successful Urban Wilderness Canoe Adventures (UWCA) program, a collaboration of Wilderness Inquiry, the National Park Service, the Mississippi River Fund, and other partners, which is a hands-on environmental education and recreation program on the Mississippi River by providing:

1) fishing and aquatic sampling activities.

- 2) overnight camping along the banks of the Mississippi in 5 communities along the River.
- 3) outdoor education and employment opportunities.
- 4) expansion of the program beyond Minneapolis and St. Paul, to serve the entire 7-county metro area, and outstate youth in communities such as Grand Rapids, St. Cloud, Hastings, and Red Wing.

Anticipated outcomes include:

- A) 6,000 youth from the Twin Cities, Grand Rapids, St. Cloud, Hastings, and Red Wing are introduced to fishing, canoeing, and camping as viable recreation pursuits on the Mississippi River.
- B) 1,000 youth participate in overnight camping along the banks of the Mississippi River or in the watershed from Grand Rapids to Hastings, and Red Wing to the Iowa border, including the Twin Cities metro area.
- C) Expansion of an aquatic sampling program on the Mississippi River, including creating a baseline of species currently in the river, and monitoring the advancement of invasive species, such as Asian Carp.
- D) 20 youth gain summer employment in outdoor and conservation jobs; 1,000 youth gain knowledge of outdoor career opportunities.

II. DESCRIPTION OF PROJECT ACTIVITIES

Activity 1: Canoeing, Fishing, and Aquatic Sampling trips for 6,000 youth

Budget: \$300,000

The Mississippi River provides wonderful opportunities for fishing and outdoor recreation. In partnership with the MN DNR MinnAqua Program and the National Park Service, we will provide water safety, canoeing, and fishing instruction for 6,000 youth, ages 10 to 18 as a part of a daylong experience on the Mississippi River. In addition, we will demonstrate an aquatic sampling program to help monitor the health of the Mississippi River. Through this program, youth will use seine nets and other fish survey techniques to identify and document the diversity and abundance of various fish species. This will help provide additional baseline fish data and document and monitor the presence of aquatic invasive species. (\$50 x 6,000 youth = \$300,000)

Activity 2: Overnight Camping and Outdoor Education Trips for 1,000 youth

Provide hands-on environmental learning trips, which will introduce youth ages 13 to 18 to camping, fishing, and canoeing opportunities that are located in their backyard. The overnight learning trips will include water quality and aquatic species education and invasive removal projects. Youth will learn about the many varieties of fish and aquatic life in the Mississippi RIver. We are working in partnership with the Minneapolis Park and Recreation Board, Saint Paul Parks and Recreation, the MN DNR, and others to establish overnight camping and water access at sites along the River. (\$150/youth x 1,000 kids = \$150,000)

Activity 3: Summer Employment in Environmental Jobs for 20 youth

Budget: \$40,000

Wilderness Inquiry and its partners will provide environmental internships and summer employment for 20 low-income youth ages 15 to 20 (recruited from the pool of 1,000 kids served through Activity 2), which consists of:

- 3-day outdoor immersion experience
- 136 hour summer employment in an environmental job. Employers who have committed to providing jobs include, but are not limited to, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, National Park Service, Mpls. & St. Paul Park & Rec, Wilderness Inquiry, and REI.

This grant will cover all expenses related to the environmental jobs for youth, including wages, transportation, meals, outdoor equipment, work tools, etc.

(Budget: 500/youth x 20 youth = 10,000 – for 3 day immersion experience with Wilderness Inquiry. 1,500/youth x 20 youth = 30,000 to recruitment, training, wages, and follow-up with youth)

III. PROJECT STRATEGY

A. Project Team/Partners:

Wilderness Inquiry (WI); **Contact: Greg Lais, Executive Director** – For more than 30 years, WI has safely conducted canoe trips for more than 300,000 youth and adults of all abilities and backgrounds. WI will provide the operational support necessary (canoes, paddles, life jackets, trained instructors, safety protocols, etc.) for the UWCA program. WI will also bring partnerships with the Minneapolis and St. Paul Public Schools, and other youth serving organizations.

The National Park Service (NPS); Contact: Paul Labovitz, Superintendent - NPS will provide educational content and Park Rangers on overnight trips. NPS will also provide opportunities for youth to perform internships in the Mississippi National River and Recreation Area. NPS will broker use agreements to facilitate use of the River with other land management agencies. NPS will provide significant in-kind personnel and funding to the project.

The Mississippi River Fund; **Contact: Katie Nyberg**, **Executive Director** - The Mississippi River Fund will provide private fundraising support, program promotion, public relations, and evaluation coordination.

- B. Timeline Requirements: We are requesting funding from July 1, 2013 to Dec. 31, 2015.
- C. Long-Term Strategy: Our goal is to build pubic awareness, commitment, and enthusiasm for the *Youth Outdoors* project to sustain it long after the initial investment of the ENRTF. We will seek to establish long-term funding options from foundations, corporations, individuals, events, and the Federal Government (National Park Service). We aim to create a new generation of outdoor enthusiasts who understand and use state water trails throughout Minnesota for fishing and other outdoor recreation pursuits, have knowledge of water quality, ecosystem health, native and invasive species, and an understanding of outdoor and environmental career opportunities.

Project Manager Qualifications and Organization Description

Greg Lais, Project Manager

Greg Lais is the Founder and Executive Director of Wilderness Inquiry (WI), the oldest and most extensive outdoor education and travel program in the world for people of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities. Since 1978, WI has served more than 300,000 people on wilderness trips, including thousands of people with disabilities such as quadriplegia, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis or traumatic brain injury.

An expert in design and implementation of integrated outdoor programs, Mr. Lais has developed outdoor policies, written staff training manuals, adapted outdoor curriculum, developed adapted equipment and published several articles on integrated programming.

Under the direction of Mr. Lais, Wilderness Inquiry has received awards from the National Therapeutic Recreation Association, Minnesota State Council on Disability Distinguished Service Award (twice), ARC of Minnesota and many others. In March 2005, WI received the American Network of Community Options and Resources (ANCOR) Community Building Award recognizing Inquiry's WI's leadership in helping to initiate change in communities and organizations that result in persons with disabilities being increasingly valued and included as community members. WI is honored to receive the American Association on Mental Retardation Full Community Inclusion Award. Mr. Lais was the recipient of the 2012 Wilderness Education Association Paul K. Petzoldt Award in recognition of his "visionary leadership in creating a world where exploring, cherishing and protecting wilderness are a human birthright for everyone."

Mr. Lais was the project manager for an Environmental Trust Fund funded project in the 1995-96 biennium, and a current project which started in July of 2010 and runs through June of 2013.

Wilderness Inquiry

A non-profit organization based in the Twin Cities, WI has provided opportunities for outdoor recreation for some of our most underserved and at-risk populations since 1978. WI serves over 13,000 people annually on canoe, kayak, horsepack, dogsled and hiking trips throughout North America, including 17 different units of the National Park Service. WI has 12 full-time and 60 part-time staff.

WI maintains a fleet of twenty-five, 24-foot Voyageur canoes, 20 canoe trailers and seven, 15-passenger vans in a warehouse at its headquarters in Dinkytown near the University of Minnesota—10 minutes away from the landing at East River Flats. These canoes are an important component of the UWCA because they provide a significant margin of safety over smaller tandem canoes. They are
