## PROJECT TITLE: MeCC 8: Dakota County Lakeshore and Riparian Protection

#### I. PROJECT STATEMENT

Completion of the LCCMR-funded Farmland and Natural Area Protection Plan in 2001 provided the science- and culturally-based foundation for Dakota County to begin protecting and managing critical land outside of the park system. County residents providing \$20M in increased property tax revenue in 2003 The 2011 LCCMR-funded Vermillion River Corridor Plan integrates and prioritizes the protection and improvement of water quality, wildlife habitat and appropriate outdoor recreational opportunities.

The project will acquire an estimated twelve conservation easements from willing landowners totaling 140 acres along Dakota County's rivers, tributaries, and creeks. These include the Vermillion River system, including North, Middle and South Creeks, South Branch and their tributaries; and the Cannon River and its primary tributaries within the County (Dutch, Mud, Chub, Darden, and Pine Creek, and Trout Brook). The project will also restore/enhance an estimated 100 acres of protected lands along Dakota County riparian corridors.

#### **II. PROJECT ACTIVITIES AND OUTCOMES**

Activity 1: Acquisition of Shoreland Conservation Easements

County Board-approved criteria are used to evaluate and rank projects based on extensive land and water assessments. A formula based on detailed land type, location and tax-assessed value is used to determine easement value for projects with an estimated value less than \$50,000. Appraisals are used for municipal or projects estimated to cost greater than \$50,000. Easements do not require public access, but projects including public access receive higher priority.

Activity 2: Natural Resource Management Plans and Restoration Budget: \$100,000

All easements require a Natural Resource Management Plan (NRMP) jointly developed by the County and the landowner. The NRMP describes the current condition, existing habitat, and preferred habitat, as well as recommendations on how to achieve mutual restoration or enhancement goals. A detailed, Landowner Agreement, including a multi-year work plan describing priority activities and responsibilities, is also completed as a core element of the easement. Due to the two-year time constraint, an estimated 50 percent of the riparian easements acquired will have final NRMPs completed by June 30, 2017. The remaining 50 percent will have preliminary NRMPs. Easements require completion of the final NRMP within six months of closing. The timing and features of the acquisition will determine if a final NRMP can be completed. The application and selection process will also include projects that focus specifically on restoration of previously protected land.

## **III. PROJECT STRATEGY**

## A. Project Team/Partners

As part of the Metro Conservation Corridor (MeCC) Partnership, Dakota County has been included in previous MeCC proposals and is included in the coordinated FY15 proposal being submitted.

Dakota County has used a very collaborative internal and external approach to its land conservation efforts during the past ten years. County Land Conservation staff has developed an excellent working relationship with other County Administrative, Assessors, Attorneys, Financial, GIS, Operations Management, Planning, Survey, Waste Regulation, and Water Resources staff to provide the full range of services necessary to successfully acquire and manage easements.

The Vermillion River Watershed Joint Powers Organization (VRWJPO) has contributed cost-share funding or in-kind services on recent and current projects, and will continue its support in the next phase of acquisitions and restoration that also achieve the VRWJPO's water-quality improvement goals. All 13 Dakota County townships have been very supportive of previous land protection efforts. The Dakota County Soil and Water Conservation District and the Friends of the Mississippi River have been critical partners in providing outreach, technical assistance, natural resource management, and easement monitoring services.

The County has worked cooperatively with the Minnesota DNR on many conservation projects, from facilitating and contributing funds for state acquisitions of new Scientific and Natural Areas and Aquatic and Wildlife Management Areas (WMA), to transferring County lands to create a new WMA and jointly managing the Vermillion Highlands complex. The federal Natural Resources Conservation Service has been a critical partner in facilitating the allocation of more than \$10M of federal funds to the County for acquiring permanent agricultural easements including permanent vegetative buffers along waterways and associated natural areas.

## B. Project Impact and Long-Term Strategy

Completion of the LCCMR-funded Farmland and Natural Area Protection Plan in 2001 provided the science- and culturally-based foundation for Dakota County to begin a new land conservation program. County residents subsequently provided an initial \$20M in increased property tax revenue in 2003 for protecting and managing critical lands that provide a multitude of public benefits. Nearly 10,000 acres have now been protected in the County.

The LCCMR-funded Vermillion River Corridor Plan, completed in 2011, integrates and prioritizes the protection and improvement of water quality, wildlife habitat and appropriate outdoor recreational opportunities in the largest metro region watershed. The plan evolved into the ShoreHolders Program and became the final component of the County's ambitious, long-term, comprehensive land and water conservation vision integrating regional parks and park reserves; a 200-mile, multi-purpose greenway system that focuses on water quality and wildlife habitat and outdoor recreation; riparian and lakeshore buffers along all streams and rivers and undeveloped lakeshore; priority natural areas; and agricultural conservation zones. County staff has estimated an additional 13,000 acres will need protection and management to fully achieve the County's goals at an estimated cost of \$42M. This project will incrementally advance the County's goals.

## C. Timeline Requirements

Due to the inherent challenges and complexities of land acquisition, we request that the completion date be June 30, 2018.



## **Organizational Description**

Dakota County is Local Government Unit bordered by the Minnesota, Mississippi and Cannon Rivers with almost the entire Vermillion River located within in its boundaries. Nearly 400,000 people live in the county that that is comprised of 14 fully developed and rapidly developing suburbs; six small, rural towns; and 13 mostly rural townships.

The County has adopted a comprehensive, long-term land conservation vision that integrates the regional park system; a 200-mile greenway system that integrates water quality, wildlife habitat and recreation; the Shoreholders buffer program for all rivers, streams and undeveloped lakeshore; natural area protection; and farmland protection.

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
