# PROJECT TITLE: Northwest Minnesota Partners Unite to Grow Eco-system Stewards I. PROJECT STATEMENT

The Friends of Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge will launch the Tamarac Nature Connection with regional natural resource partners in the Fall 2019. The program will serve as a model for other regions in the state to improve hands-on environmental education in the field. This program will be spearheaded by a part-time environmental educator, who will also serve as a volunteer manager. With the goal of creating a self-sustaining program, education delivery strategies will be determined by an advisory team consisting of Friends of Tamarac board members and representatives of the regional partners.

- Eight regional entities coming together to provide environmental education in the field.
- Ten school districts and 3 stand-alone schools to receive environmental education reaching 11,361 students.
- More than half of the school districts educate children enrolled in the White Earth Tribe.
- Partner organizations to provide the scientific expertise to train staff and volunteers.
- Volunteer teams recruited, trained and managed to provide outdoor, hands-on activities.
- In the field, grade-level appropriate instruction that addresses environmental literacy and graduation standards.
- Annual evaluation on how the program meets best practices for environmental education, as identified by the North American Association for Environmental Education in their Guidelines for Excellence in Environmental Education.
- Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge is 43,000 acres, encompasses three major biomes, and will serve as the primary outdoor classroom for many of the activities.
- Develop traveling replica sculptures to enhance identification of invasive species vs native species.
- Published guide and presentations to share the partnership process and successes.

As a regional coordinator, the Tamarac Nature Connection will increase the capacity of partners to meet their environmental education priorities, as measured by the increase in number of programs presented and the number of students attending.

#### **II. PROJECT ACTIVITIES AND OUTCOMES**

**Activity 1:** Establish an advisory team of natural resource partners to develop a regional strategy for environmental education and recruit volunteers for the regional delivery of programs and outreach.



The mission of Friends of Tamarac is to facilitate activities and programs that educate, interpret, protect and restore the natural and cultural resources of Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge. Established in 1992 this nonprofit group is made up of an active 12 member board and over 200 members. The Friends sponsor educational programs and events, build observation platforms, generate thousands of grant dollars for water quality and habitat projects, host a popular nature photography contest, and so much more. Our energy and passion is evident in a recently completed an \$800,000 classroom building, Tamarac Discovery Center, and initiating an effort to further develop the volunteer education leaders that are the heart of the outdoor programs. We are an advocate for wildlife refuges and passionate about protecting wild places for generations. We feel connecting people and nature is a vital component to sustainable, healthy communities. The volunteers of Tamarac donated over 7,000 hours of service in 2017.

The education program at Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge, Tamarac Adventures, has been a success with the community for over 5 years. During that time we've developed relationships with seven partner school districts. The majority of this program is funded through private donations. The program currently engages 700 students in on-site activities in the course of three visits during each school year. 50% of the schools are from the White Earth Indian Reservation and we'd like to add more and become a regional provider of environmental education. The Friends of Tamarac are committed to growing into a new education program that supports the region in developing environmental stewards.
