Project Summary: Wilderness Inquiry engages 20,000 Minnesotans through outdoor adventures, promoting equity in access to outdoor activities, places, and careers and supporting stewardship and conservation values for current and future generations.

Describe the opportunity or problem your proposal seeks to address. Include any relevant background information.

Our youngest generation is less connected to the natural world than any previous generation. Children in the U.S. spend 4-7 minutes a day playing outside and over 7 hours a day in front of a screen. At the same time, researchers report that outdoor learning improves student performance, increases participation in science learning, strengthens attention, and positively impacts STEM career motivation.

Through this project, Wilderness Inquiry will:

Connect youth and families to outdoor activities that teach about stewardship, conservation, and outdoor career pathways.

Equip youth with tools to be future stewards of Minnesota's natural resources and problem solvers in addressing climate challenges.

Build social-emotional capacities in youth through activities focused on outdoor recreation and education.

Additionally, according to a report in The Lancet measuring climate anxiety in youth, 84% of respondents were at least moderately worried about climate change and 59% were very or extremely worried. Of respondents, 50% reported feeling: sad, anxious, angry, powerless, and helpless.

Experiences in nature increase confidence, improve social-emotional capacities, and facilitate deep and meaningful connections to self, community, and our environment. Wilderness Inquiry seeks to support equitable access to the outdoors while empowering climate stewardship and developing social-emotional and skill-building capacities in youth.

As a signatory of the Minnesota Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights, Wilderness Inquiry believes that youth have the inherent right to outdoor experiences that promote physical, social-emotional, and academic wellbeing. Unfortunately, many youth face barriers to participating in outdoor activities, specifically youth from communities historically and currently underrepresented in the outdoors.

Through this project, Wilderness Inquiry will engage 20,000 Minnesotans through a continuum of outdoor experiences that lead to positive engagement and behavior outcomes, instill stewardship ethics, and inspire interest in outdoor careers. Through this increased engagement, our youngest generation of Minnesotans will become more empowered to address the challenges ahead, including actions to mitigate biodiversity loss and climate change. ENRTF funding will support the development and expansion of programs including: day and virtual adventures through Canoemobile that connect youth to waterways and public lands in every region of Minnesota; nearby-nature experiences that provide a gateway for youth and families to experience state parks or an overnight camping experience; extended trips for youth, adults, and families to connect in inclusive, shared experiences in parks and wilderness areas; pathways to careers through fellowship opportunities and engagement with industry professionals; and implementation of STEM-based and climate-education curriculum (including Project WET/WILD).

What are the specific project outcomes as they relate to the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's natural resources?

Success includes increasing the knowledge and skills of youth to cultivate sustainable lifestyles and fostering connections to Minnesota's natural environment.

This project will support:

Placed-based, outdoor experiences for 20,000 Minnesotans.

Broad-based partnerships with schools, government partners, faith-based organizations, and nonprofits.

Engaging diverse and changing demographics – of Wilderness Inquiry participants, 12% identify as having a disability, 48% identify as BIPOC, and 74% receive financial aid.

Building a lasting and action-based conservation ethic through training on wilderness ethics (Leave No Trace, Project WET/WILD) and recreation-based opportunities for youth and families that build tangible skills and increase social-emotional learning capacities.

Activities and Milestones

Activity 1: 20,000 Minnesotans Experience Nature-Based Adventures that Instill Stewardship Ethics, Improve SEL Outcomes, and Provide Pathways to Outdoor Careers.

Activity Budget: \$1,500,000

Activity Description:

The Outdoor Pathways project will engage 20,000 Minnesotans across a continuum of backyard to backcountry outdoor experiences that build community in the natural world by breaking down barriers to outdoor education, recreation, and careers. These experiences range from introductory day programs; to multi-day and overnight extended adventures across a variety of Minnesota outdoor spaces; to skill-building and leadership development opportunities for outdoor careers.

Outcomes:

Build capacity to implement programs across the state. This Includes acquiring equipment; developing partnerships; hiring and training staff; and maintaining operational systems that directly support this work.

Implement environmental education curriculum, including natural resource stewardship, STEM-learning, and climate education (e.g., Project Wet/Wild).

Engage 20,000 youth and families in place-based programs demonstrated to promote positive physical, social-emotional, and academic outcomes.

Measure the impact of programs on personal development and social-emotional learning (SEL) capacities among participants. Strong SEL capacities are foundational to youth experiencing positive wellbeing and academic outcomes. Wilderness Inquiry has four measurable program goals: 1) to build positive connections between participants and trusted adult leaders; 2) to increase connections between participants and the natural world; 3) to help participants connect with their inner selves; and 4) to provide stronger connection to community.

Wilderness Inquiry maintains a diversified budget, wherein funding from state government sources is matched 4:1 by other contributed and earned revenue. Additional funding includes earned revenue from trip sales (unique to Wilderness Inquiry's model), corporate and foundation support, individual contributions, and proceeds from endowments we maintain with JP Morgan Private Bank. Matching (in-kind) contributions to this project include costs associated with planning, delivery, and administrative and other investments needed to successfully deliver on programming. We will continue to develop these contributed and earned sources of revenue to sustain the impacts of this work beyond the life of this project.

Meg Krueger, Adventures Director: Ms. Krueger oversees all aspects of operations and program development, implementation, and delivery for Wilderness Inquiry. This includes more than 500 program events each year serving more than 27,000 people across Minnesota and around the country. In this capacity, Ms. Krueger supervises and oversees all Wilderness Inquiry program and operations staff (currently 11 FTE), as well as our seasonal staff and Outdoor Leaders (120+ staff annually).

From 2018-2022, Ms. Krueger led environmental education and conservation work with government and nonprofit agencies in Texas and Louisiana. Ms. Krueger previously served as Wilderness Inquiry's Education Program Manager from 2015-2018, and prior to that was a high school teacher in the Minneapolis Public Schools.

Ms. Krueger has extensive experience in the areas of program development and implementation, curriculum development, staff hiring and training, supervision, evaluation, budget development and management, and partnership development.

Organization: Wilderness Inquiry

Organization Description:

Wilderness Inquiry's mission is to connect people of all ages, backgrounds, identities, and abilities through shared outdoor adventures so that all people can equitably experience the benefits of time spent in nature.

Wilderness Inquiry programs, which range from single-day introductory activities to multi-day adventures, provide outdoor education, recreation, and career pathway opportunities while building community through engagement in the natural world. We meet participants and partners where they are and offer nature-based experiences designed to teach about stewardship, conservation, environmental education, and support learning around STEM, geography, and history – ultimately equipping the next generation with the resources needed to protect and participate in Minnesota's great outdoors.

Through our programs and adventures, we primarily seek to serve core audiences from communities historically and currently underrepresented in the outdoors – including people with disabilities, individuals who identify as BIPOC and/or LGBTQ+, and individuals and families that experience financial inequity. Each year we connect 27,000+ people to inclusive outdoor experiences on public lands and waterways in more than 50 communities across Minnesota and around the country.

Wilderness Inquiry is governed by a 17-member volunteer board of directors and has 23 full-time and 120+ part-time/seasonal staff.
