Project Summary: Enhance outdoor recreation opportunities and preserve water quality of Knowlton Creek, a designated trout stream, by rehabilitating 6,500 feet of the Duluth Traverse to improve accessibility and address erosion.

Duluth has about 100 miles of multi-use, bike-optimized trails, including the Duluth Traverse, which spans the entire city. However, only 6 miles are accessible for adaptive recreation equipment, creating barriers for individuals with disabilities, despite growing awareness of the importance of adaptive outdoor recreation for physical and mental health. COGGS is leading efforts to upgrade trails in Duluth to expand adaptive recreation opportunities. In 2024, a 2-mile adaptive-friendly loop was added to the Duluth Traverse. However, the connection between this loop and a formalized trailhead with parking, restrooms, and water remains inaccessible to adaptive equipment. An inclusively designed connection is needed to ensure equitable access to high-quality outdoor recreation for individuals of all abilities. This project also offers a chance to address environmental issues. Sections of the Duluth Traverse near Knowlton Creek suffer from erosion due to high-clay soil, leading to sediment runoff into the trout stream. Without action, continued trail degradation will harm water quality and threaten the long-term sustainability of the trail system. By addressing these accessibility and environmental challenges, this project aims to create a more inclusive, sustainable trail network that benefits the entire community.

This proposed project will rebuild approximately 6,500 linear feet of the Duluth Traverse between Gogebic Street and the Spirit Mountain Recreation Area to meet Kootenay Adaptive Standards. This reconstruction will create a fully connected, accessible route linking the Spirit Mountain trailhead to newly constructed adaptive-friendly trails between Knowlton Creek and Kingsbury Creek.

The project will address persistent erosion and runoff issues affecting Knowlton Creek, a designated trout stream, by capping high-clay soil areas to improve drainage, reduce sedimentation, and enhance sustainability. Trail improvements will increase accessibility, providing a safe, high-quality experience for riders of all abilities.

Funding will support trail reconstruction, erosion control measures, and surface improvements to ensure long-term durability and environmental protection. The project will be implemented through collaboration with the City of Duluth, COGGS, and the Spirit Mountain Recreation Area Authority, with ongoing maintenance supported by City funding and COGGS' volunteer stewardship program.

By creating a direct, inclusive, and sustainable connection between key trailheads and adaptive-friendly trails, this project will expand outdoor recreation opportunities while preserving natural resources. It aligns with Minnesota's goals of conservation, accessibility, and enhancing public engagement with the outdoors.

What are the specific project outcomes as they relate to the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's natural resources?

Project outcomes include:

Rehabilitation of 6,500 feet of the Duluth Traverse to protect and enhance natural resources by reducing erosion and runoff into Knowlton Creek, a designated cold-water trout stream, and improve water quality and habitat health. Enhance sustainability, preserve surrounding ecosystems, and mitigate soil degradation by rehabilitating the trail with a capped surface.

Expand and foster long-term stewardship of natural spaces for people of all abilities by providing inclusive access and connections to high-quality outdoor recreation opportunities.

These efforts align with the state's goals of preserving natural resources while enhancing recreational opportunities for all users.

The City of Duluth, COGGS, and Spirit Mountain will implement and maintain the rebuilt trails as part of the City's official trail system. Ongoing upkeep, including erosion control and surface repairs, will be supported by COGGS' volunteer program and City funding. Additional work for continued enhancement of the Duluth Traverse will be funded through local and state grants, local tourism initiatives, and private sponsorships. Community engagement, including educational signage and organized events, will promote awareness and responsible use. These efforts will ensure long-term sustainability, improved accessibility, and continued high-quality trail experiences for all users.

Ansel will be responsible for grant and project management, including coordinating efforts between the City of Duluth's construction management team, LCCMR, and the Cyclists of Gitchee Gumee Shores (COGGS) to ensure all project elements are completed successfully according to the project work plan.

As the Executive Director of COGGS for 2 years, Ansel leads the organization through thoughtful community building, outdoor recreation advocacy, and skillful coordination of multi-use and bike-optimized trail improvement and maintenance projects to protect natural resources and connect people to the outdoors. By developing strong partnerships with other nonprofits, businesses, and City staff, Ansel creates momentum for community-identified priorities, such as the development of Duluth's first trails to incorporate universal design principles.

Before joining COGGS, Ansel was a professional trail builder and owned a trail construction company where he developed a keen understanding of budget management, effective construction coordination, trail sustainability practices, and creating trails that meet performance and safety standards.

Organization Description:

The Cyclists of Gitchee Gumee Shores (COGGS), established in 1994 as a nonprofit 501c3 organization, has become a leading non-profit mountain bike advocacy organization in the Duluth, Minnesota and Superior, Wisconsin area. COGGS

is committed to sustainable trail development, equitable trail access, and developing a welcoming outdoor recreational culture by promoting opportunities, education, programming, partnerships, and healthy outdoor fun.

COGGS has over 1100 members and provides volunteer maintenance for more than 100 miles of bike-optimized trails within the City of Duluth through close coordination with Duluth Parks & Recreation. The Duluth Traverse is a critical component of the trail system, connecting parks and neighborhoods across the entire city and facilitating an average of 130,000 user engagements each summer.

The City of Duluth manages over 11,368 acres of green space, including 162 parks and over 350 miles of a diverse trail network. The Duluth Parks & Recreation mission is to promote the health and well-being of the Duluth community, environment, and economy by facilitating recreational opportunities and coordinating the enhancement of parks, facilities, and natural areas now and into the future.
