Describe the opportunity or problem your proposal seeks to address. Include any relevant background information.

Thompson County Park is a 58-acre park located in West St. Paul near Highway 52 and Butler Ave East and connected to the 7-mile River to River Greenway. The Park serves more than 50,000 residents in the northern part of Dakota County and had an estimated 300,000 visitors in 2022.

Nearly 90% of the park is natural or semi-natural vegetation, which is unusual for a park surrounded by urban development, and presents a unique opportunity to provide access to nature and education to the park's many visitors.

As demonstrated through the accessibility evaluation during the planning process, the park is a destination for those with limited mobility. Active older adult programming occurs at the Activity Center, but inadequate ADA-accessible options exist for outdoor activities, limiting the ability of different park visitors to experience the full range of offerings at Thompson Park.

Given the scale of Thompson County Park in its urban setting, there is a unique opportunity to activate more areas of the park and provide engaging and inclusive access for Dakota County residents and visitors of all ages and abilities to learn more about and interact with diverse ecosystems and natural areas.

The proposed inclusive improvements activate core areas across the park, enhancing visitors' ability to navigate and engage with a variety of natural areas, gathering places, and play opportunities. With all improvements, native plantings, interpretative signage, and invasive species management are proposed to improve the quality and educational components of the Park's ecosystems.

Improvements (safety signage, seating, and bike amenities) at two park entrances welcome and orient visitors to the park. Complementing the existing inclusive playground, an immersive nature play experience will accommodate individuals on the autism spectrum with a variety of stations, from physically challenging active play to sensory, creative, and imaginative play, to areas for gathering and relaxation.

New ADA-accessible picnic areas and trails will provide visitors and the regional greenway users a place to rest and explore in the south side of the park. A natural surface trail loop will connect the greenway to the new picnic area and a proposed bridge crossing Simon's Ravine.

A proposed gathering area will complement Thompson Park Center, providing space for weddings, park events, and group programing. The ADA-accessible area will have ample seating options from concrete retaining walls to flexible grass areas, and include electrical hookups for lighting and audio.

What are the specific project outcomes as they relate to the public purpose of protection, conservation, preservation, and enhancement of the state's natural resources?

Through new ADA-accessible trails, gathering areas, and inclusive nature play, improvements will provide park visitors with opportunities to learn about and form meaningful connections with nature, while enhancing the quality of the natural resources in the project areas. The proposed elements will increase the park's accessibility for visitors of all ages and abilities, fostering a curiosity and care for the natural environment. Construction will include installation of native species to enhance woodland habitat and invasive species management. Along and throughout the improvements, interpretation will be provided, satisfying visitors' curiosity about the natural world.

Activities and Milestones

Activity 1: Design Development and Approvals

Activity Budget: \$100,000

Activity Description:

The objective of this activity is to finalize the designs, necessary approvals, and advertise the bid for the various inclusive recreational improvements in Thompson County Park. Tasks include completing design review with the Department of Administration and SHPO, approving final designs, and going out to bid for the project. The improvements identified in this proposal come from the Thompson County Park Master Plan, so this phase of the process will continue design development through construction documents and incorporate community feedback, building on the existing efforts of Dakota County. County Park staff will work with design consultants to finalize design plans and prepare all necessary documentation for reviews and going to bid. Park staff will oversee the advertising of the bid and move the project into the pre-construction phase. The funding for this portion of the project will come from match funds.

Activity 2: Bidding and Pre-Construction

Activity Budget: \$100,000

Activity Description:

Once the design and construction documents are finalized, the second main activity of this project will bring the inclusive recreational improvements through bidding and contractor preparation for construction. Tasks include contractor selection, acquiring all necessary permits and funding, and construction preparation.

County Park staff will oversee the selection of contractors during the bidding process and help as agreed upon with construction administration and oversight. Contractors will complete pre-construction tasks including site preparation. The funding for this portion of the project will come from match funds.

Activity 3: Construction

Activity Budget: \$3,800,000

Activity Description:

This activity brings the proposed improvements through construction to project completion. Tasks include construction, construction oversight and administration, and project close-out.

Construction of the inclusive nature play area includes removing invasive species; installing native woodland plantings; constructing ADA-accessible paths; installing interpretive signage; installing play features including natural wood play structures, balance logs and steppers, musical instruments, and other elements; and installing seating.

Construction of entryways, trail improvements, and picnic areas include installing a picnic shelter, picnic tables, and grills; constructing ADA-accessible trails; constructing a bridge over Simon's Ravine; installing wayfinding signage, benches, and bicycle parking and fix-it facilities; and installing native plantings for the appropriate ecosystems along trail areas.

Construction tasks for the gathering area include re-grading and re-aligning existing trails to make them ADA-accessible; constructing retaining walls as seat walls incorporated into existing grades; constructing the paved plaza at the base of the area; and installing perimeter plantings around the gathering area and surroundings.

County Park staff will help as agreed upon with construction administration and oversight. Contractors will complete construction tasks. The outcomes of this activity include increasing inclusive and accessible outdoor recreation options for park visitors and opportunities for educational engagement and gathering in the park.

Additional capital improvements identified in the park master plan will be funded through the annual capital improvement budgeting process. Long-term maintenance and management of these improvements will be performed by the Dakota County Parks and Facilities Department as part of the County's ongoing management program. These activities are funded by tax levy and external grant funding.
