To protect natural resources while nurturing recent popularity in cross country skiing and safe trails the Norpine Trail Association has the need to upgrade many of its trails to address erosion, drainage issues, and erosion from recent increased rainfall. Upgrades to the Trail system would also address the recent increase in cross country skiing popularity.

Upgrades include drainage issues, erosion, grading, trail widening, and culvert replacement. We would need to purchase grade fill for some washed out trail areas as well as the replacement of 3 large culverts located on our trail system that were recently washed out from large storms with high levels of rain during short periods of time. We hope the fixes will address future weather with high rain levels that we continue to see on the North Shore.

- 1. Increase in usership of the Norpine Trail system specifically from people new to the sport of cross county skiing
- 2. Increase in environmental awareness and importance of natural resources
- 3. Decrease in erosion on the Trail system

Activity 1: Fix/repair trails

Activity Budget: \$10,000

Activity Description:

The Norpine Trail association if awarded funds will immediately.

1. Hire and schedule local contractors to order and install 3 of the washed out culverts located on the trail system.

2. Norpine Trail Association will work with the local State Parks and DNR to order fill/gravel for the project.

3. Board member and other volunteers will move the fill to the areas in need. This is done with our equipment and volunteers.

4. Complete all projects by the first week in November of 2026.

We are a small organization with 2 main purposes, restoration and maintenance of trails during the of season and grooming, education, and marketing during the winter months. Our organization meets monthly to review all needed works and is a hands on organization dedicated to improving our trails and the number of people using them.

Describe how restoration efforts will utilize and follow the Board of Soil and Water Resources "Native Vegetation Establishment and Enhancement Guidelines" in order to ensure ecological integrity and pollinator enhancement. We work closely with the DNR and State Parks, and SNA staff before any works is done on any of our trails. All of our work has already been discussed with the appropriate agency and approved. Because our trail system is located on State Land, Federal Land, and SNL land we have contacts with each necessary agency and follow all requirements when making improvements on the trail system.

4. Describe how the long-term maintenance and management needs of the parcel being restored with these funds will be met and financed into the future.

Our strategic plan as an organization is to increase the amount of funds we reserve for trail maintenance moving forward given climate change and weather pattern changes. We are also partnering and organizing with other local trail system and Lutsen Mountains for a first ever fundraiser for the trail system on the North Shore to take place at their new event space opening up in 2026.

We will discuss such contracting with our DNR, SNA, and State Parks staff.
